

FROM DECLINE TO DISTINCTION: INSIDE ABIA'S BOLD CIVIL SERVICE RENAISSANCE

When the country's most influential administrators gather in Umuahia, the Capital City of Abia State, renowned as God's own State from November 30 to December 5 for the 44th National Council Meeting of Civil Service Commissions of the Federation, they will meet a State dramatically different from the one many remember.

For some, the conference is far more than a routine gathering, it is a declaration of rebirth, a bold and public unveiling of a Civil Service undergoing one of the most ambitious transformations in contemporary Nigeria under the able leadership of Governor Alex Chioma Otti. For others, Abia's selection as host is no coincidence, but a national endorsement of the State's sweeping reforms and pragmatic leadership.

For the first time in decades, the conversation around Abia's Public Service has shifted from stagnation to renaissance, one rooted in clear vision, disciplined execution and purposeful innovation.

At the centre of this renaissance is Pastor Dr Eno Jerry Eze, Chairman of the Abia State Civil Service Commission, a Human Resource Professional, governance reform advocate whose blend of administrative rigour is driving initiatives that promote excellence, merit based systems and innovation in Public Service delivery.

Pastor Dr Eno Jerry Eze brings to the Commission a rich blend of HR expertise, governance experience, and pastoral leadership. Her philosophy of purposeful, people-centred leadership is shaping a new culture across the State workforce.

With a background spanning Banking, Oil and Gas, Development Consulting and Church Ministry, Pastor Dr Eno Jerry Eze's vision is to restore the quality of public service through a professional, skilled system fully equipped to support the present administration is gradually yielding the desired dividends.

When Pastor Dr Eno Jerry Eze assumed office as Chairman of the Commission, many observers sensed that a shift was imminent. Few, however anticipated the scale, depth and pace of transformation that would follow. Today, under her leadership and with the political will of Governor Alex Otti, Abia State is emerging as a national model for Civil Service renewal in terms of modernization, accountability, digitally

enabled and fiercely merit-driven.

Her words at a pre-conference briefing were as confident as they were revealing: "Abia has earned this moment. The choice of our state to host the 44th Council Meeting is a national recognition of the reforms we have institutionalised under the leadership of His Excellency, Governor Alex Otti. Our systems are working again, and we are ready to showcase them".

For years, successive administrations grappled with a Civil Service weighed down by redundancy, outdated practices, stalled promotions and a pervasive culture of stagnation. But since the advent of Governor Alex Otti's administration, the narrative has shifted dramatically with the State Civil Service reclaiming its administrative identity.

Dr Eze describes this shift with the clarity of someone who has spent her career studying how institutions succeed and fail.

"The Civil Service is the engine room of any functional state. If it breaks down, governance collapses. Our focus is to rebuild that engine professionally, ethically, and systematically so it can deliver the Governor's vision for a modern, efficient and citizen-centred Abia".

This philosophy guided the creation of the Commission's first comprehensive strategic plan, complete with a new vision, mission, and values system; the foundation upon which the new Abia Public Service stands.

Under her leadership, the Commission now pursues a clear vision: A corps of professional, disciplined and productive Civil Servants dedicated to delivering exceptional service to the people of Abia State, A New Abia and New Ways of Working.

One of the most visible achievements of the Commission is the Digital Revolution in the State's Civil Service and aggressive adoption of technology. Under, the present administration, Abia has moved away from outdated administrative processes and towards a full Human Resource Management Information System (HRMIS), a first in the State's history.

Perhaps the most significant shift is the Commission's merit-based recruitment of 771 Health Professionals, Consultants, Medical Officers, Nurses, Dental Specialists

and Therapists selected through a digitalised and transparent Computer-Based Testing (CBT) model where every stage was automated. Candidates wrote tests and received results instantly. Interviews were structured in batches to ensure professionalism. The Civil Service Commission has also recorded notable milestones with the support of the Governor, which include Skills Mapping for the Entire Civil Service. With the groundbreaking exercise underway to document competencies across all Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs), this will feed into the forthcoming Human Resource Management Information System (HRMIS), which will digitise the entire civil-service lifecycle from recruitment to retirement.

Capacity Building and Professional Development. In partnership with the State Government, the Commission has sponsored Civil Servants for Local and National Training Programmes, including 20 delegates to the Chartered Institute of Personnel Management (CIPM) Conference.

Clearing Backlogs and Strengthening Discipline. The Commission has sorted out the backlog of promotions for 2022, 2023, and 2024 while the process for 2025 is ongoing. The Commission has also closed out lingering disciplinary cases.

Top State in Health Emergency Preparedness: Abia State was recently ranked the most prepared state in Nigeria for Health Emergencies, according to the 2025 SBM Health Preparedness Index report, scoring 26.85, the highest in the country. This achievement reflects the Commission's deliberate investment in human health capital, robust budgetary allocations (14.8% of the state budget), and strong governance systems. It further underscores the effectiveness of the Commission's recruitment and capacity-building efforts and the State's readiness to respond effectively to health crises.

Publication of the Annual Report (1 January – 31 December 2023): For the first time in many years, the Civil Service Commission produced and published a comprehensive Annual Report covering activities from 1 January to 31 December 2023. This report documents the Commission's reforms, recruitment processes, promotions, disciplinary actions, capacity-building efforts, policy updates, and strategic priorities. Its publication has strengthened transparency, accountability, preserving institutional memory and provides stakeholders with clear, data-driven insights into the Commission's work and impact.

Enhancing Partnership and Synergy: The Commission has partnered with other MDAs (the Head of Service, Ministry of Health, Office of the Secretary to the Government) to achieve various initiatives of the present administration. In partnership with Coscharis, Abia has rolled out electronic buses, demonstrating our commitment to innovation and improving public services.

Other key achievements of the Commission Include:

*Abia Leadership Academy (Investing in Generation NEXT).

* **Supporting Ongoing Civil Service Reforms:** The Commission supports ongoing Civil Service reforms, including the process of transitioning from administrative-clerical services and routine manual documentation to strategic HR Management, managing people (talent) and resources to achieve specific goals and objectives.

Beyond the Civil Service, Pastor Dr Eno Jerry Eze also leads Abia's Human Capital Development (HCD) portfolio, an assignment she describes as "the heart of good governance". Her philosophy is simple: Governance succeeds when people are empowered.

Under this approach, the State integrates HCD initiatives across Education, Health, Agriculture, Women Affairs, Poverty Alleviation, the Disability Commission and the Civil Service Commission. Abia now meets National budgetary benchmarks in Education and Health, recruits professionals to strengthen public institutions and ensures prompt payment of salaries and pensions - a sharp break from the past.

The Commission is already mapping out the next chapter of its transformation agenda with the full deployment of the Human Resource Management Information System (HRMIS), Technology-driven Personnel Management, Enhanced service standards across MDAs. Other elements of the next chapter outlook of the Abia public service include Strengthened performance evaluation and productivity metrics, deeper collaboration with the Office of the Head of Service and continued transition from manual administration to strategic HR Management.

As all 36 States and the Federal Capital Territory gather in Umuahia to participate in the week-long 44th National Council Meeting of Civil Service Commissions of the Federation, it would be an opportunity for delegates to study the fast-evolving model of public service transformation in Abia State. They would encounter a State determined to redefine the meaning of public service in Nigeria. The ongoing reforms reflect not just administrative restructuring, but a deeper cultural shift, a rebirth of purpose, professionalism and accountability.

In many ways, the 44th National Council Meeting is the story of a State reclaiming its pride of place at the National level. It is the story of a people discovering that governance can indeed be made different and better. It is also the story of a woman whose leadership has become synonymous with renewal.

As Abia State steps into national spotlight during the Annual Council Meeting, one message stands clear: Abia is building a modern, motivated and high-performing public service reinforcing Governor Otti's commitment to build "A New Abia". Certainly, the old ways of doing things that had, over the years, stagnated Abia's development have finally given way to a new order of efficiency in management of human and material resources.

Solutions For Nigeria's Security Economy And Unity.





Abia's Season Of Laughter

"When the righteous are in authority, the people rejoice; but when the wicked bear rule, the people mourn." — Proverbs 29:2

Humanity today lives in a perilous world—aptly described as a global village marked by international conflicts, poverty, disease outbreaks, floods, and violent crimes. Global politics is increasingly shaped by narrow interests that redefine our shared humanity to favor the most powerful nations, drifting away from ideals that serve the common good of all.

At the national level in Nigeria, the narrative is not much different. While there are concerted efforts at the federal level to stabilize the economy through what experts describe as sound macroeconomic policies, the realities on the ground tell a harsher story. For the average Nigerian, the expected relief has remained elusive. Beyond economic hardship, insecurity continues to mutate—poverty, banditry, jihadist violence, wars, and other forms of crime exact a heavy toll on daily life.

Yet, in a small corner of South-East Nigeria called Abia State, a different story is unfolding.

After more than three decades of mismanagement, corruption, and ineffective leadership, a new chapter began on May 29, 2023, when Governor Alex Otti assumed office with a clear promise to wipe away the historic tears of his people. The slogan was simple yet profound: "Weep no more, help is on the way." True to that promise, Abians stopped weeping from the very first day of his administration.

Thirty months on, it has been smiles—and more smiles.

If there is any doubt, consider this: on Saturday the 13th, Abians and non-Abians alike gathered in colorful attire to celebrate one of the state's cultural icons, Bright Chimezie. The music was electrifying, food and drinks flowed freely, and members of PMAN alongside top comedians filled the hall with laughter. The newly rebuilt and retrofitted Dr. Michael Okpara Auditorium added grandeur to the occasion, amplifying the joy that enveloped the venue. Smiles were everywhere; laughter filled the air; fun was abundant.

This was no coincidence.

Today, events across Abia State follow the same joyful pattern. This happiness is not accidental—it is driven by deep public satisfaction with the works of Governor Otti and his efficient team. A grateful populace is expressing its contentment in laughter.

Just a day earlier, on Friday the 12th, Abia hosted a night of comedy that drew some of Nigeria's finest comedians. Laughter flowed until ribs ached. Remarkably, the First Lady of the State, Her Excellency Mrs.



Priscilla Otti, was among the high-profile guests who stayed through the event until the early hours of the morning—an uncommon but telling gesture of solidarity with the people.

The Saturday event itself was organized by the Abia State Government through the Ministry of Arts, Culture, and Creative Economy to honor Bright Chimezie. Earlier, notable Abians such as Paulson

Kalu, Sam Ohuabunwa, Senator Chris Adighije, and Senator Enyinnaya Abaribe had also been celebrated—reflecting the administration's deliberate commitment to recognizing sons and daughters of the state who have contributed to human civilization in their own ways.

The hall erupted when Governor Otti made a surprise entrance. His presence electrified the atmosphere. If there is a governor with an organic relationship with his people, Governor Otti stands out. From the onset of his administration, it has been smiles, laughter, and shared hope between leader and people.

The peak moment came when he rose to speak. A pin-drop silence fell as the audience leaned in for his words. Then came the announcement: he had just returned from Abuja, where Abia State emerged winner of the 2025 Nigeria Governors' Forum (NGF) Primary Healthcare Leadership Challenge. Abia clinched the South-East zonal prize of USD 500,000. As he shared the news with the ecstatic crowd, laughter and cheers burst forth from faces already glowing with joy.

There are many other reasons Abians are smiling. Like a seasoned long-distance marathoner, Governor Otti continues to surge forward without slowing down. His end-of-year activities speak volumes: timely budget presentation, the launch of a 25-year development plan, commissioning of electric commuter buses to ease transportation challenges, the provision of free transport to bring Abians home for Christmas and above all the timely payment of workers' emoluments. As at date nearly all public sector workers in Abia have been paid the December wages plus an extra called the 13th month. This is quite a significant achievement for a people who in the locust years of Abia History most often observed the Xmas and New Year festivities without being paid their salaries. A situation which discerning writers of that era often dubbed as 'black Xmas'.

Today, smiles define the faces of Abians—from the keke driver to the bus driver, from the street vendor to the industrialist. From the Aba shoe manufacturer to the village farmer, it is same smiles. Governor Otti has lifted a historical burden, wiped off the tears and replaced it with smiles.

Indeed, the timeless biblical truth rings true once more: when the righteous are in authority, the people rejoice.

ABIA: THE BUDGET OF ACCELERATED DEVELOPMENT AND NEW POSSIBILITIES

The presentation of Abia's 2026 Appropriation Bill on Tuesday, 25 November 2025, by Governor Alex Otti stands as one of the most defining policy statements of his administration. With a landmark sum of N1.016 trillion, the Budget of Acceleration and New Possibilities signals a bold and deliberate effort to reposition Abia on the path of rapid development, structural transformation and sustained prosperity. It is a budget crafted not for routine governance but for rebuilding, expansion and future shaping.

A central feature of the budget is its unprecedented capital expenditure profile. Governor Otti allocated N811.8 billion, representing 80 percent of the entire budget, to capital projects, a scale that reflects unmistakable intent and strong political will. The recurrent component stands at N204.4 billion or 20 percent, covering expanded personnel obligations and administrative needs. This capital-heavy structure, one of the highest in the country, demonstrates a firm resolve to move Abia permanently from stagnation to productivity.

Education remains at the heart of the governor's development philosophy. The sector receives N203.2 billion, amounting to 20 percent of the total budget. This allocation will sustain salaries for fifteen thousand teachers, support the construction of seventeen new model schools, establish three technical colleges and upgrade ICT laboratories and staff quarters in more than one hundred schools. Tertiary institutions, including Abia State University, Ogbonnaya Onu Polytechnic and the College of Education Arochukwu, will receive N52.8 billion for salaries, hostels, lecture theatres and critical facility upgrades.

The health sector also receives significant attention with an allocation of N149.7 billion. The governor plans to renovate seven general hospitals, upgrade twenty three primary health centres, equip ABSUTH with essential medical facilities and expand manpower development. These interventions align with the governor's previous achievements, which include the restoration of key hospitals, refurbishment of two hundred primary health centres, recruitment of seven hundred and seventy one health workers and increased enrolment in the state health insurance scheme, now at one hundred and twenty thousand residents.

Infrastructure remains a major pillar of the 2026 fiscal plan, with N169.3 billion dedicated to extensive road development across all zones. Key roads include the Umuahia Ikot Ekpene Road, Ahiaeke Okwuta Bende Road, Nkata Amaeke Road, Agbo Umueze Mbom Road, and the Umuoji, Mgboko and Amauzukwu Mbom corridors. These routes are strategic economic arteries that will unlock commerce, reduce travel time and strengthen logistics for citizens and businesses.



Public transportation receives N11.1 billion, including N6 billion for the procurement of eighty additional electric buses and the completion of modular transport terminals. This investment strengthens the governor's broader modernisation drive aimed at improving mobility, reducing emissions and

establishing a more efficient urban transportation system.

Energy remains another signature priority. The governor announced that Abia has acquired electricity distribution assets outside the Aba ring fenced zone, reinforcing the state's ambition for energy independence. With the full implementation of the Abia State Electricity Law and the establishment of ASERA, the administration is laying the foundation for a competitive, reliable and self-sustaining power ecosystem.

Governor Otti also reviewed the 2025 fiscal year, highlighting achievements that provide a credible foundation for the 2026 budget. These include over six hundred kilometers of roads built or rehabilitated since 2023, a doubling of school enrolment following the introduction of free basic education, the recruitment of more than five thousand teachers with another four thousand to follow, and a projected IGR of N100 billion by year end. Abia's emergence as the most prepared state for health emergency response in Nigeria further underscores the depth of ongoing reforms.

The state projects a total revenue of N607.2 billion, comprising N223.4 billion in internally generated revenue, N83.2 billion from FAAC, N67.1 billion VAT, N26.5 billion grants and N168 billion from other federal inflows. This leaves a deficit of N409 billion, which the governor insists will be financed strictly through concessional loans reserved solely for capital projects. His categorical assurance that not a penny will be borrowed to fund recurrent expenditure underscores a disciplined approach to public finance and a decisive break from unsustainable practices of the past.

The 2026 budget therefore stands as a strategic instrument for statewide transformation. It accelerates development, unlocks new possibilities and reinforces the governor's commitment to building an Abia where institutions work, where infrastructure supports growth and where every community feels the presence and impact of government.

Governor Otti's vision for a modern, productive and forward looking Abia continues to take clearer shape. With this budget, he sets a bold and confident pace for 2026 and strengthens the belief that Abia's best years are no longer aspirational but emerging.

Abia State Governor, Dr Alex Otti, OFR, has signed into law and officially unveiled the Abia State 25-Years Development Plan with assurances of its sustainability over the period of the plan.

Unveiling the plan aimed at lasting from 2025 to 2050, at the International Conference Centre, Umuahia, the State Chief Executive, said that, the plan is a holistic development framework upon which the State's policy direction and resource allocation outlook will be evaluated.

"The 25-Years Abia State Development Plan, which we have signed into law and unveiled, is a dynamic document that captures our resource advantages as a State, our current position on the development ladder, and where we hope to be in the next 25 years as we commit ourselves to certain decision pathways with respect to public sector spending, effective governance paradigm, process strengthening and consistency in building the competencies of our people and institutions", Gov. Otti stated.

The Governor underscored that what his administration is doing is not completely new, but bothers on planning, noting that the former document was reviewed to meet today's reality and assured of its sustainability, given the fact that it has a legal backing.

"There was a 30-year development plan. But the advent of COVID and the change in the direction of the government, both at the centre and at the sub-national level, have combined to render that document invalid.

The Governor, who assured of the sustainability of the plan explained why some development plans fail, and maintained that the 25-Years Development Plan would not fail because of the legal backing, having been passed into law by the State House of Assembly and assented by the Executive Governor.

"A number of reasons have made development plans to fail. The first is the absence of a legislative framework to instil discipline in the execution.


"The second is the inability to realistically anticipate bombs and outline mitigation measures, or as we see all the time, the reckless pursuit of private interests by political actors and the absence of a suitable framework for calling them to order.

"All these pitfalls have been carefully noted, and in line with our determination to achieve the priority targets as captured in the plan, we have anchored our aspirations on a firm legislative foundation through the State House of Assembly.

"It's going to be very, very difficult for certain administrations to evade it, simply because it has passed the scrutiny of not only SBAS and development partners, but the State House of Assembly. So, what I did moments ago was to sign this document into a law" Gov. Otti stated.

Governor Otti commended members of the State Economic Management Team for the brilliance of their work and the commitment to getting the plan put together in good time and members of the Abia Global Economic Advisory Council for providing important directions, guiding the team and enriching the document with their extensive knowledge. He also appreciated the roles played by some development partners including, the UNDP, PIND and others.

In his goodwill message, the United Nations Development Programme Resident Representative, Ms Elsie Attafuah, represented by Ms Maureen Okoro said that the event signals the State's determination to pursue a long-term, coherent, people-centered development pathway that prioritizes sustainability, inclusion and shared prosperity.



The UNDP commended the visionary leadership of Governor Alex Otti for embarking on the ambitious exercise, noting that the development plan aligns strongly with UNDP's core development principles, evidence-based planning, inclusive growth, sustainable finance and human development, and assured of its support to execute the plan.

Also Speaking, the representative of Partnership Initiative In Niger Delta (PIND), Mr Chuks Ofolue noted that the 25-Years Development Plan which is a review of the 30-years development plan of the previous administration is more focused, adding that the document will serve as a guide for subsequent administrations.

The President of Aba Chamber of Commerce, Industries, Mines and Agriculture (ACCIMA), Mazi Jude Nwosu said that the plan represents government's commitment to transforming the State into a fleet of progress, innovation, prosperity and vibrant economic hub in West Africa, and applauded Governor Otti for the bold step.

The unveiling ceremony, which attracted many dignitaries and top government officials, featured the signing of the 25-Years Development Plan into law by Governor Alex Otti in company of the leadership of the Abia State House of Assembly.

GOV. OTTI LAUNCHES FIRST STATE-OWNED ELECTRIC BUS SERVICE

....Offers Free Ride To Commuters



Abia State Governor, Dr. Alex Otti, on Monday officially launched the First Phase of the Abia Green Shuttle Electric Bus Service, with the unveiling of 20 Electric Buses for public transportation as part of the State's drive towards sustainable, efficient and modern urban transportation.

The buses, which are part of the State's effort to reduce carbon emissions and promote eco-friendly transportation, will offer free rides to commuters starting tomorrow and are expected to ply major routes in the State including Umuahia, Aba, Umunneochi, Ohafia, Ukwa LGAs

Governor Otti who announced this at the commissioning ceremony, held at the International Conference Center, Umuahia, described the initiative as a bold step towards the future and a deliberate move to align the State with global climate and sustainability goals.

The Governor said the project, which began as a plan to procure Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) Buses, was deliberately upgraded to Electric vehicles in line with the world's transition towards net-zero emissions.

He explained that although CNG buses are cleaner, they still emit carbon, which prompted the State to "leapfrog" into full electrification.

"Today is a special day for us in Abia State as it defines our movement towards the future. Like has been explained, the journey started with Compressed Natural Gas powered buses. But then we had in mind the target that the world is headed towards and that is net zero emission.

"We knew that even though CNGs are cleaner gases, they are also not without emissions. And we thought we should leapfrog and go to electric buses", Governor Otti added.

The Governor disclosed that the procurement process encountered

challenges, including the need to redesign the buses to make them compliant with the needs of Persons With Disabilities (PWDs).

"At some point we realised that they were not PWD compliant and we had to start afresh to ensure that they were built in. And I can announce today that the 20 electric buses here are PWD compliant", he said.

Governor Otti further revealed that the project was nearly stalled due to delays in the delivery of charging infrastructure after the vessel conveying them suffered a mid-sea accident, but said the State successfully improvised.

"So we now had to put on our thinking caps and somehow we found a solution.

And today we have charging stations here. We are expecting a few more", he stated.

According to him, the buses will begin scheduled operations immediately, with free rides for commuters until January, as part of efforts to familiarise residents with the new system.

"For this period between tomorrow and sometime in January these buses will take our citizens to and through free of charge. You get into the bus stations, you queue up. Once the bus arrives it is first come first served", Governor Otti said.

The Governor who warned that misconduct would be tracked through onboard surveillance cameras, also announced plans to install public charging stations across Aba, Umuahia and other parts of the State.

He encouraged residents to consider Electric vehicles as a cheaper long-term transport option.

The Director-General of the World Trade Organisation (WTO), Dr. Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala, who commissioned the buses, described the initiative as "extraordinary" and timely, given the global fight against pollution and climate change.

She congratulated Governor Otti and his team for what she described as visionary leadership, noting that the initiative would contribute to cleaner air and healthier cities.

According to her, although Africa contributes only about three per cent of global carbon emissions, the continent must still play its part in promoting a cleaner and more sustainable environment.

"One of the biggest things we suffer from in the world is the problem of pollution and climate change.

"Even though Africa contributes only three percent of global carbon emissions, yet all of us have to contribute to a better climate for the world", she said.

Okonjo-Iweala expressed optimism that the project would mark the beginning of environmentally friendly transport reforms in Abia.

"So the fact that in Abia State, we are doing something extraordinary in bringing these buses is just a delightful thing. I hope that this is just the beginning and we will go from strength to strength", the WTO boss said.

She congratulated the State Government on the achievement and urged it to sustain the momentum in climate-smart development initiatives.

In his remarks, President and Chief Executive Officer of Coscharis Group, Dr. Cosmos Maduka, said Abia has provided National leadership by becoming the first State to officially launch Electric Buses for public transportation in Nigeria.

"This afternoon, Abia State is the first official State that is launching Electric Buses into this country. And there's no doubt that other States are going to follow suit", he said.

Dr Maduka revealed that his company initially proposed CNG buses to the State Government but commended Governor Otti's insistence on Electric Buses.

"We did everything we can to convince him to go CNG, but he insisted it would be electrification or nothing. It's not a dream anymore, it's a reality", Dr Maduka said.

The COSCHARIS boss, highlighted the advanced features of the buses, including air-conditioning, surveillance cameras and onboard charging ports, stressing that the service was designed for all social classes.

He predicted that the buses would gradually reduce reliance on Tricycles and Motorcycles in the State's urban centres, assuring that the Abia Green Shuttle Bus Service no discomfort.

Earlier in his remarks, the Commissioner for Transport, Mr. Chimezie Ukegbu, described the launch as a historic milestone in the State's transport evolution and attributed its success to Governor Otti's leadership.

"This event marks a historic milestone in our journey. This initiative is a direct product of his (Governor Otti's) forward-thinking agenda and his resolve to reposition Abia State as a hub of innovation, sustainability and inclusive development", the Commissioner said.

He noted that beyond environmental benefits, the electric bus programme would deliver long-term economic benefits including job creation, skills development among other social gains.

"Electric buses are more cost effective to operate and maintain in the long run. This programme also opens new opportunities for skills development, technical training and job creation", he added.

The Commissioner assured residents that the Ministry of Transport would continue to expand the initiative and work closely with Transport Union's and other Stakeholders to ensure a smooth transition.

"This is not an end but a beginning. It is about safe routes, cleaner air, modern mobility and a future we can all be proud of", Ukegbu said.

The ceremony featured and a test ride around the city of Umuahia led by Governor Otti, to signal the official commencement of the Abia Green Shuttle Electric Bus Service.

The Abia State Judiciary has formally marked the opening of the 2025/2026 Legal Year with the theme "Reforming Abia State Justice Sector in the Digital Era".

The opening ceremony, which took place recently in Umuahia, began with a special thanksgiving service at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Chapel, Federal Medical Centre (FMC), Umuahia. It continued with an inspection of the Guard of Honour by the Chief Judge of Abia State, Hon. Justice Lilian Abai, and a special court session held at the High Court Complex, Umuahia.

The event, which had the Governor of Abia State, His Excellency Dr. Alex Chioma Otti, as the Special Guest of Honour, drew together judges, magistrates, lawyers, traditional rulers, and top government officials to mark the beginning of another

judicial calendar.

In his address, Governor Otti congratulated members of the Bar and Bench on the commencement of the new legal year, commending the judiciary for its steadfastness. He assured that the executive arm of government would continue to partner with and support the judiciary to ensure efficient and timely justice delivery in the state.

'The judiciary, as the third arm of government, has demonstrated that it can perform its duties without interference,' the Governor said.

"I am happy to support you in the area of digital transformation. I have already approved a request from the Honourable Attorney-General to digitize the entire judiciary and move away from the days of carrying files", he added.

Governor Otti announced that the 17 court halls being constructed by the state government across the local government areas would soon be commissioned. He disclosed that the facilities are digitally enabled, equipped with solar or renewable energy, air-conditioned auditoria, and other modern amenities befitting a 21st-century court.

He further revealed plans to commence the construction of Judicial Complexes in Umuahia and Aba, each with 15 court halls, 1,000-seater auditoria, and high-speed internet connectivity to support ongoing justice reforms in the state.

In her remarks, Hon. Preaching from Acts 17:16 on the topic "Are You Not Provoked by Our Present-Day Justice System?" he challenged judicial officers to confront the flaws in Nigeria's justice system and uphold the values of integrity and fairness.

Rev. Onyeukwu commended the judiciary for consistently seeking divine guidance and described honest and upright officers as "men and women of honour who will be distinguished for doing right." Special prayers were offered for the Chief Judge and her team.

The ceremony also featured goodwill messages from the Attorney-General and Commissioner for Justice, the Chairman of the Nigerian Bar Association (NBA) Aba Branch, and other legal dignitaries.

He urged all stakeholders to embrace digital reforms not as a novelty but as a means of fulfilling their sacred oath to make justice accessible, impartial, and timely.

"Let us resolve in this legal year to build a justice system worthy of the people's trust and the Constitution's mandate and leave behind not only a reformed Judiciary but also a stronger Abia state where Justice is indeed, shield of the weak and the guide of the strong, Uwana added.






The Abia State Ministry of Women Affairs has once again demonstrated strong resolve and resilience in the successful conclusion of the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence (GBV). The campaign, which commenced in November, culminated on December 10, 2025, with a series of impactful awareness and advocacy activities held across Umuahia and Aba.

The programme, themed "Unite to End Digital Violence Against All Women and Girls," was designed to raise public awareness, foster stakeholder collaboration, and strengthen collective efforts to combat all forms of violence against women and girls, with particular emphasis on emerging digital threats.

A major highlight of the campaign was the Walk Against Gender-Based Violence, organized by the Ministry of Women Affairs in partnership with the Abia State Police Command in Umuahia and Aba. The walk attracted wide participation from women, school children, civil society organizations, and community stakeholders, creating a powerful public display of unity and commitment to ending GBV. The road walk served as an effective sensitization platform, conveying clear messages such as "Say No to Gender-Based Violence" and encouraging community ownership of the fight against abuse.

At the closing ceremony in Umuahia, the Wife of the Governor of Abia State, Mrs. Priscilla Otti, reaffirmed the unwavering commitment of the Abia State Government to eradicating all forms of violence against women and girls, including digital violence. Her message, delivered by the Wife of the Deputy Governor, Mrs. Adaeze Emetu, highlighted the government's bold and strategic interventions aimed at addressing the rising challenge of digital violence. She announced plans for the inauguration of a High-Level Gender-Based Violence Committee, to be chaired by Mrs. Priscilla Otti, by January, as well as the establishment of a state-of-the-art Sexual Assault Referral Center in Aba to enhance survivor support and response services.

In her address, the Commissioner for Women Affairs, Dr. Maureen Aghukwa, emphasized that Gender-Based Violence must no longer be treated as a private family issue but recognized as a societal challenge requiring collective action. She commended the Abia State Government for its sustained support to the Ministry and partner agencies in strengthening prevention, response, and prosecution mechanisms across the state.

The programme also featured robust educational and advocacy sessions, including two expert lectures on Gender-Based Violence, which offered practical insights into prevention strategies, legal frameworks, and survivor support systems. NAWOJ reaffirmed its commitment to promoting safe digital spaces and responsible media practices, while calling for zero tolerance for online abuse. The association pledged to continue leveraging the power of the media to educate, advocate, and protect the rights of women and girls. FIDA, on its part, stressed the need to strengthen legal frameworks, improve access to justice, and promote community-driven prevention strategies to eliminate all forms of GBV.

The Police Community Relations Committee (PCRC) Women Wing also participated actively, joining the awareness walk and providing strong moral and institutional support. An interactive awareness session educated the public on recognizing, reporting, and preventing GBV, while encouraging bystanders to speak out against abuse.





The Heart Unlocking Their Secrets



ANATOMY AND PHYSIOLOGY

The **HEART** is a vital organ, muscular, hollow, and cone-shaped -located in the thoracic cavity that pumps blood throughout the body, supplying oxygen and nutrients to tissues and organs. It's about the size of a fist and is located in the thoracic cavity. The heart has four chambers: the left and right atria, and the left and right ventricles. It beats around 100,000 times per day, pumping approximately 2,000 gallons of blood.

The heart starts developing very early in the embryo, around day 18 to 19, and begins beating by about day 21 or 22. The four chambers and four valves are enclosed in a protective sac called the pericardium. It works through coordinated electrical impulses and muscle contractions, ensuring efficient blood flow.

FUNCTIONS

The heart is divided into the right and left sides, each with an atrium and a ventricle. The right side handles deoxygenated blood, pumping it to the lungs, while the left side pumps oxygenated blood to the rest of the body. The heart's conduction system, including the sinoatrial node, atrioventricular node, and Purkinje fibers, ensures that the heartbeat is rhythmic and coordinated. Plus, the heart is incredibly adaptable, capable of adjusting its rate and strength of contractions based on the body's needs.



IRI-IJI-OHA ABAM ONYERUBI 2025

The people of Abam Onyerubi, in Arochukwu Local Government Area of Abia State, on Friday, October 24th, 2025, trooped out in grand style to celebrate their Iri-Ji-Oha Abam Festival, a colorful display of heritage, unity, and thanksgiving. The event, which took place at the Abam High School Field, drew an impressive crowd and full participation from the Abam Onyerubi Ancestral Kindred Communities across Igboland founded by the legendary Abam warriors and explorers of old.

The festival ground was a breathtaking spectacle of colors, sounds, and movement. From the fearsome Atu Mkpi of Idima to the majestic Ekpe masquerades from Ndi Oru in Ikwuano and Ndi Oji Abam, every performance echoed the ancestral strength and artistic depth of Abam culture. The Ite-Igbo troupe from Ozu Abam and the War Dance of Amuru Abam added further energy and excitement, showcasing the community's rich variety of traditional performances.

It was indeed a harvest of talent; singers, drummers, dancers, instrumentalists, and artists all contributing to the rhythm and beauty of the day.

Earlier in the morning, the Abam High Chiefs, led by His Royal Majesty, Eze Sir Ralph Ogbonna, the Onyerubi I of Ndi Oru Ancient Kingdom, performed the traditional pouring of libation at the gravesite of Onyerubi Attita Akpo, the revered patriarch and founder of Abam. This solemn rite signified respect to the ancestors and invoked blessings for the festival.

In his welcome address, the President of the Abam Development Union, Chief Okere Kalu, traced the deep roots of the New Yam Festival in Abam tradition.

"The Iri-Ji, or New Yam Festival, has for centuries stood as a sacred and unifying celebration of life, harvest, and heritage across Igboland. But in Abam, it takes on an even greater significance, it brings together all communities of Onyerubi Attita Akpo's lineage in one grand festival of gratitude and pride."

Chief Okere emphasized that the 2025 edition was more than a feast, it was "a mirror of identity and pride."

"The Iri-Ji-Oha Abam Festival is the heartbeat of our people. Every dance step, every drumbeat, every masquerade tells the story of our past, our resilience, and our shared future. It is a celebration of the land that sustains us, of yam; the king of crops and of the enduring spirit of Abam Onyerubi."

He further highlighted the festival's role as a platform for cultural promotion and community development, reaffirming that Abam remains "a people deeply rooted in tradition, yet forward-looking in progress."

In his goodwill message, His Royal Majesty, Eze Sir Ralph Ogbonna, commended the unity and collaboration among the Onyerubi Attita Ancestral Kindred.

He gave a historical insight into the origins of Abam settlements:

"In the era of 'Occupation by Conquest,' our forebears—

"Onyerubi and his brother Udumeze Attita Akpo joined forces with warriors from Abam, Ohafia, and Idima, as well as the Ume Dynasty of Ndi Aworo, to reclaim and settle territories now known as Ikwuano. Their courage earned them not just the right to dwell but to lead and protect the land. Through time, they integrated, multiplied, and shaped the socio-cultural identity of the present Ikwuano people."

He noted that the warriors brought with them their enduring traditions, Kamalu Agbatuzo, Ekpe, and other customs that still thrive today.

Representing the Governor of Abia State, Dr. Alex Chioma Otti, Chief Matthew Ekwuruibe, the Honourable Commissioner for Culture, Arts, and Creative Economy, praised the Abam Onyerubi people for their cultural preservation and community spirit.

He remarked that "culture is the foundation of a people's identity" and urged them to continue upholding their traditions. Chief Ekwuruibe also revealed that the state government is taking deliberate steps to revitalize heritage and tourism sites across Abia State, including those in Abam Onyerubi.






She does not overshare or broadcast every detail of her life.


